RD 1, New York Leveling Rod, unsigned, c. 1870.

This two-piece jointed rod extends to 12 feet and has a 5" red-and-white round sliding target, lacking the clamp-screw from the target. The divisions on the face of the rod are cut into the dark wood with the numerals highlighted by silver paint. There is no white-painted background on the face as with the Philadelphia rod



RD 2, New York Style Mining Leveling Rod, unsigned, c. 1875.

This $4\frac{1}{2}$ two-piece jointed rod extends to 8'. It has a round $5\frac{1}{4}$ " red-and-white brass sliding target. The face of the rod has divisions cut into the dark wood but is unpainted.



RD 3, Folding 10-feet Leveling Rod in Feet & Inches, unsigned, c. 1880.

This rod is hinged in the middle.



RD 4, Philadelphia Leveling Rod, J.C. Sala, San Francisco, c. 1900.

This rod has a painted white face on wood with divisions in hundredths of a foot shown with fine black lines. It is 13 1/2 feet long extended and has a 6" diameter red and white sliding target.

RD 5, Architects Leveling Rod, Keuffel & Esser Co., Catalog No. 6280, c. 1913.

This rod is 5 1/2 feet long closed and 10 feet extended.



RD 6, Boston Leveling Rod, W.& L.E. Gurley Co., c. 1920.

This rod is 12 feet long and has a 4" diameter red & white target. There is a repaired split in the wood.



RD 7, Philadelphia Leveling Rod, E. Dietzgen Co., Catalog No. 6506, c. 1930.

This rod face and divisions are painted on wood. It is 5 feet long closed and 9 feet open. There is a 6" oval red & white sliding target.



D 9, New York Leveling Rod, unsigned, c. 1900.

This rod is 6 1/2 feet long closed and about 13 feet open. The face has no white-painted background as does the Philadelphia rod. It has a 4" diameter red and white target. The graduations in hundredths are shown by fine black lines.

RD 10, Three-target Rod for Distance Measure, W. & L.E. Gurley Co., c. 1930.

This unusual rod is 2-meters long and has fixed black & white targets at the 0 and 2-Meter locations. There is also a sliding red and white target. The zero point of the scale does not correspond to the bottom of the rod. This is possibly a type of stadia rod used by the USC&GS. In a canvas case.



RD 11, Four-Piece Leveling Rod, unsigned?, c. 1930.

RD 12, Philadelphia Leveling Rod, unsigned, c. 1900.

This rod is 6.8 feet long closed and extends to about 12 feet. The hundredths are indicated by thin black lines similar to the Sala rod RD 4 although this has no sliding red & white target.

RD 13, Stadia Rod, A. Lietz Co., c. 1940.

This rod is 2 ¾" wide with the diamond design pattern, alternating. It is 12 feet long and has a 2 fold secured by thumb screws. It is catalog No. 450 in the 1938 catalog. A matching companion rod to this was identified with a Lietz maker's tag but this has none although there are markings in the wood where a metal tag was once attached.
